INVITATION TO THE 26th ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE AUSTRALIAN INSTITUTE OF OCCUPATIONAL HYGIENISTS

“OCCUPATIONAL HEALTH FORENSICS: ANALYSING THE EVIDENCE TO MAKE A DIFFERENCE”

The 26th annual conference of the AIOH will be held at the Burswood Entertainment Complex in Perth, Western Australia from the 29th November – 3rd December 2008.

Along with the mining and resources sector boom, the profession of occupational hygiene has grown rapidly in the four years since the conference last came to Western Australia. As occupational health needs grow, customer and allied health professions are starting to recognise occupational hygiene as an integral part of their occupational health programs. With a view to promoting a higher level of occupational hygiene recognition both within the occupational health environment and in the wider community, the 2008 conference theme is “Occupational Health Forensics- analysing the evidence to make a difference” which will be reflected in our programme and events. The intent of occupational hygiene is after all, the use of hygiene professionals to intervene for worker health where it is at risk.

Our goal in 2008 is to motivate and inspire those attending the conference by highlighting how the work of an occupational hygienist parallels that of a police forensic scientist. Similar approaches to the identification, collection and analysis of samples are used and legal compliance and excellent communication are essential for both professions. However, while police forensic science is limited to investigation of past events, the primary aim of occupational hygiene is prevention of harm. Through our conference programme we hope to introduce new techniques and approaches to current issues and outline emerging issues that impact the health of workers.

Of particular interest this year will be professional motivation with the SEA keynote speaker Kurek Ashley, internationally renowned high performance coach and motivational speaker for athletes, performers, politicians and corporate identities alike. In addition, Robin Napper, ABC’s forensic expert will be providing a keynote session on best practice forensic and investigative processes.

Other areas of interest will include hazard identification, collection of exposure data, health risk assessment, and investigation, legislative compliance, intervention and control of workplace exposures, emergency response, and effective stakeholder communication. These topics will be addressed by a range of national and international experts at plenary, workshop and continuing education seminars. In addition, we have a record number of poster presentations this year, with a dedicated poster author meet and greet session scheduled for Wednesday morning.

The Continuing Education Seminars (CES) for OH&S practitioners will once again be provided on the preceding weekend to ensure delegates can develop and maintain knowledge and skills in a variety of disciplines and fields of interest.

Of particular interest in the continuing education programme will be the “Challenges of dealing with contaminant asbestiform minerals in the occupational environment” workshop featuring some of Australia’s most experienced asbestos investigators and facilitated by Dr Barry Chesson.



Also included this year will be the COH examinations for those intending to seek certification.

The Trade Exhibition promises to be one of the largest yet, with a variety of Australia's leading technical equipment suppliers, consultants and service providers in attendance. This will enable you to view all the latest instruments available in the field of occupational hygiene and allow delegates the opportunity to discuss their application in the field with some of the knowledgeable technical experts who will be in attendance. We are looking forward to having our regular exhibitors, as well as welcoming some "first timers". GETTING THERE

The aim of the “Cold Cases” session is to inspire and motivate young hygienists to take the necessary risks to improve their professional experiences while striving for excellence in their professional duties.

COH MAINTENANCE POINTS

Maintenance points for COHs registered under the AIOH Certification Scheme will be awarded for attendance at CESs, PDCs and the Conference. Each half day CES will attract 0.5 points and the 2.5-day conference 2.5 points.

COH EXAMINATIONS

The AIOH Certification Board will be holding oral examinations for prospective Certified Occupational Hygienists on Saturday 29th and Sunday 30th November 2008. Candidates should submit their applications to the AIOH office.

The application form is available at the Certification Section on the AIOH website.

The prerequisites for sitting the oral examination are:

- five years of professional occupational hygiene work experience; and
- acceptance in another IOHA recognised certification scheme, e.g. successful completion of the American Board of Industrial hygiene (ABIH) comprehensive practice examination.

ABIH MAINTENANCE POINTS

Application has been made to the American Board of Industrial Hygiene for points to be awarded for attendance at the Annual Conference and to those completing approved Continuing Education Seminars. In the past, a 2.5-day conference has attracted 2.5 CM points and half day CES 0.5 CM points.

TRADE EXHIBITION

There will be an extensive Trade Exhibition by major international and national suppliers of occupational hygiene and health and safety equipment. The Trade Exhibition is an integral component of the Conference and enables delegates to experience firsthand the latest developments in instruments, personal protection equipment and expert consulting services.

TRANSPORTATION

A number of options are available for delegates travelling to the Burswood Convention Centre. These include;

City Shuttle The City Shuttle offers transport from both the International and Domestic airport terminals to most hotels in Perth. The cost is approximately \$13 per person to Burswood Entertainment Complex. Note: If there is more than one person to be transferred a Taxi will work out to be more economical. Tax Taxi ranks are easily accessible at the International and Domestic airport terminals, providing transport within Perth and its surrounding areas. The cost of a taxi from the Perth International Airport to Burswood is approximately \$20 to \$25 dollars. Taxi fares from the Domestic Airport to Burswood are approximately \$15. Prices will vary depending on the time of day and peak periods.

Rail The Burswood Train Station is located approximately 70 metres from the east end of Burswood Dome, and is situated on the Thornlie rail line. A courtesy bus leaves from the station to the main Complex entry every 15 minutes and runs in both directions. For full rail services and timetables visit www.transperth.wa.gov.au

Hire cars Hire cars are available at the airport. The venue has 1,450 free parking bays available including under cover bays at a cost of \$10 for a 24-hour period.

The full membership interview focuses on the applicant's work and on their level of knowledge and skills in the different areas of occupational hygiene. The COH oral exam primarily focuses on the applicant's ability to apply their knowledge and skills in real life situations presented as scenarios. This workshop will cover the interview process for both an applicant for Full membership and for a COH applicant. The course will not focus on technical content but rather on the process and on what the interview panels are looking for in an applicant. Attendees should come away from this workshop with a very clear idea of what is required of them if they wish to become a Full member or a COH.

Occupational Hygienists wishing to become Full members and/or Certified Occupational Hygienists, as well as COHs, wishing to be involved as an interview panellist in the future.

Course Outline

This seminar will present the basic principles of biological monitoring techniques and strategies within a context of occupational hygiene assessments. It will provide authentic examples of the application of these principles in workplaces. It will also extend these principles into environmental settings where the focus is on the protection of community health, and will introduce elements of risk assessment and risk communication.

Although pitched at an introductory level, this seminar touches on a range of principles that extend the knowledge base and proficiency of occupational hygienists. It is suitable for younger hygiene professionals aiming to broaden their experience, but also for practising hygienists who wish to expand the range of tools and techniques they may offer to their clients. For occupational medical practitioners and occupational health nurses this seminar will place the collection of data into a context of data interpretation and risk assessment. Environmental health professionals and hygienists who find they are more commonly called upon to investigate environmental hazards and risks will also find this seminar useful.

Topic: ***Challenges of dealing with contaminant asbestiform minerals in the occupational environment***

Facilitator: Dr Barry Chesson

Course Outline

Asbestos may be a banned material under Australian OH&S legislation, however, the reality is that it is such a widespread mineral in the geological environment that contact still occurs in a considerable number of mining, construction and waste disposal activities. This workshop addresses the issue via toxicological and risk assessment concepts, identification and exposure assessment issues, and highlights potential political, litigation and commercial problems.

Topics

- An international overview on contaminant asbestiform minerals in non-asbestos mining and construction operations.
- Asbestos in ore bodies.
- Asbestos Risk Assessment and the adequacy of existing standards and controls for contaminant asbestos minerals.
- Contaminant Asbestos – Litigation Risk.

All OH&S personnel who deal with asbestiform minerals in the workplace.

Topic: ***Occupational noise exposure - making a difference: a workshop for practical thinkers***

Course Outline

This session intends to look at occupational noise exposure from a practical perspective by keeping things simple. It is designed and intended to stimulate discussion and further thought such that through a process of understanding the problem solutions become more self evident. Looking from the perspective of the exposed individual and those charged with initiating preventative action we will try to build a basic understanding of the problem and gateways for realistic solutions.

This workshop will not take a highly scientific approach but will be based on solid scientific principles in order to encourage good understanding of what is occurring.

All OH&S personnel who have contact with those who work in noise, or where noise exposure becomes a hazard.

Topic: ***Ambient air monitoring for volatile organic compounds using US EPA methods***

Presenter: Dr Nigel West, Chemistry Centre of Western Australia

Course Outline

This CES presents a general overview of sampling and analysis for volatile organic compounds, including carbonyl compounds such as formaldehyde, using US EPA methods TO14/15, TO17 and TO11. The merits of whole air sampling using evacuated canisters compared with chemisorbent trapping are discussed. Practical hints and tips are provided to consultants who wish to use these methods for ambient and indoor air quality investigations. An understanding of the issues facing the analytical laboratory together with sampling requirements will be covered in order to help consultants gain the most from their investigation.

All OH&S personnel air quality consultants and laboratory personnel.

CES 9: **Sunday 30 November 2008** **0900-1230**
Topic: ***Mining and mineral processing - the changing and challenging role of the hygienist***

Presenter: Mr Mike Rowe, DOCEP, Western Australia

Course Outline

Mike Rowe first visited a minesite in 1982 when he was asked to investigate several cases of acute mercury exposure. Since then he has visited most mine sites in Western Australia, first as a consultant, then as a regulator.

The complexity of mining, processing and refining has increased significantly during this time and the role of the occupational hygienist has also changed to reflect the diversity and needs of the industry. Mike will cover the risk assessment process he applies to new projects in Western Australia. Part of the process is to review the design of the plant and the control systems that will be used. He particularly focuses on the various chemical inputs, the properties of the process streams and management of emissions.

This presentation will provide many examples of potential problems that may be encountered at each stage of the mine activity - from exploration drilling, through mining, crushing, processing and/or refining, then finally to waste management. He will also illustrate problems that can be specific to the various mineral sectors within WA.

Target Audience

Occupational hygienists, metallurgists, engineers and mine health, safety and environment personnel.

CES 10: **Sunday 30 November 2008** **0900-1230**
Topic: ***Shake, rattle and roll - an introduction to whole-body vibration at work***

Presenter: Mr David Warrington, Noise & Vibration Measurement Systems Pty Ltd

Course Outline

This presentation focuses on the problem of whole-body vibration as a workplace health and safety issue. Content includes an explanation of whole body vibration, some common causes, short and long term health effects, measurement and assessment methods including demo of B&K's new 4447 HV Analyser in WBV mode, guidance and legislation (or the lack of it), some basic vibration control options, and the current state of WBV research globally.

Target Audience

It is expected that this seminar will be useful to those tasked with measuring and assessing workplace vibration, or assessing the health effects of it. This includes OHS advisers, occupational hygienists, noise officers, safety officers, occupational nurses, occupational therapists, ergonomists and sound & vibration consultants.

Please note - It is likely that some of the content will also have been covered in the AIOH-sponsored 1-day courses delivered by Beno Groothoff in 2008 and NVMS's own 1-day Human Vibration Measurement Course (next of which is 21st November 2008) but the style is intended to be more conversational than technical for this CES.

Topic: ***Sample speciation using advanced physical analysis techniques***

Presenter: Rick Hughes, Microanalysis Australia Pty Ltd

Course Outline

In this CES we will cover a wide range of advanced physical analysis techniques to speciate samples, both in bulk and on filter papers. The techniques that will be presented include; X-ray diffraction (XRD), X-ray fluorescence (XRF) scanning electron microscope (SEM) combined with energy dispersive spectrometer (EDS), X-ray photoelectron spectroscopy (XPS), QEMScan, electron probe, ion probe, the use of synchrotron energy, laser particle sizing equipment, CT scanning, surface area analysis, leco analysis and other techniques.

The presentation will explain the principle of each technique, how it can help in speciation, and examples of real samples and potential application of each technique in assessments of hazardous particles. The presentation will be based on the presumption that the participants have some basic scientific knowledge, but people do not have to know each of the techniques mentioned above.

Target Audience

This CES is relevant to occupational hygienists who have to identify what species of particles are in the workplace.

Nanotechnology is a rapidly expanding area of research and industry with the potential to generate many innovative products. Many of these products include nanoparticles (three dimensions less than 100nm) including medicines, diagnostics, water purification, pollution remediation, food additives, food packaging, clothing and IT applications. Therefore their use is widespread with the potential for exposure to humans and the environment. There is some evidence to suggest that some nanoparticles are very reactive within biological systems and so this session will assess the evidence to nanoparticle hazard to humans and the environment.

Topic: *Industrial ventilation for occupational hygienists*

0900 - 1700

Presenter: Mr Peter Roy, Coffey Environments Pty Ltd

Course Outline

Many workplaces use materials and processes that release hazardous substances - and sometimes physical agents into the workplace. The effects of these can range from nuisance and irritation to serious acute and/or chronic occupational illness or injury. In many situations, effective dilution or local exhaust (or extraction) ventilation systems may offer the only practical and effective means to reliably control the hazardous exposures or conditions. Well-designed ventilation systems can also help control other workplace environment conditions, which may affect comfort, morale, and productivity. Poorly designed or poorly operated systems can have the opposite effect.

The programme will cover the basic and applied concepts of:

- physics of airflow;
- dilution ventilation for health for control of fire and explosion risks;
- types, designs and functions of local extraction hoods;
- ductwork systems;
- single and multi-hood exhaust (extraction) systems;
- fans and stacks; and
- trouble shooting LEV systems.

Air cleaning devices and indoor air quality will be briefly mentioned, but will not be covered in detail. The programme will include a course hand out booklet, examples and case histories, a "Rogue's Gallery" of site photos and some calculation exercises; for the latter a calculator will be necessary.
